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Gateway to consider closing Canyon

With a projected enrollment of just 19 students for the 2006-2007 school year, the Gateway Unified School District may vote to close Canyon Elementary School in Lakehead when the next board of trustees' meeting is held at that school on July 26.

"It's a beautiful school, beautiful area. It has everything but kids," Superintendent John Strohmayer said at the June 21 board of trustees' regular monthly meeting held at the district office.

The school's closing has been discussed in the past, including during previous school closings in the district for Bass and Toyon.

According to Strohmayer, enrollment at Canyon was 151 students for the kindergarten through eighth grade school before Gateway's unification. When the district switched Canyon to a K-5 a few years ago,

they had 45 students. That dwindled to just 25 students by the end of this past school year, Strohmayer said.

"And five of those are fifth graders, with just two kindergartners (coming in)," he said. After contacting many of the Canyon parents, Strohmayer said the district expected the school to start the 2006-2007 school year with just 19 students.

Strohmayer added that the district spent around \$315,000 to educate those students last school year. Next year, it would work out to roughly \$15,000 per student, while high school and other students in the district cost the district about \$6,500 to \$7,000 each to educate.

"We're not in the business to make money, but we want to have the money to (educate our students)," he said.

Board member Rose Smith agreed: "I don't want to close Canyon, but it's not fair to the rest of the district."

In fact, none of the four board members in attendance (Kay Kobe, Debbie Bourne and Fred Braun were absent) or among the 10 or 15 audience members really objected to the closing, including Board Member Greg Ramsey, who represents the Lakehead area and seemed resigned to the decision.

Ramsey said the closing of the school appeared "inevitable," although he seemed to be in favor of waiting until the winter break of the 2006-2007 school year or until the 2007-2008 school year to give parents time to prepare.

However, Ramsey asked that if the item was to be placed on the July 26 agenda, that it be flexible enough so that if something comes up at that meeting that would include keeping the school open, that the district would have the option to do so.

Other concerns were raised about bus transportation, espe-

cially the effect it might have on the youngest students, and what to do with Canyon Elementary School itself if the board of trustees decides to close the school.

Strohmayer said various options will be looked at, including possibly making Canyon into some kind of day camp.

"It is the center of that community," he said, noting the importance of keeping a presence up in that area.

Board member Ken Matias also suggested that, should the district close the school, the gymnasium remain open for the community to use and even use the school to possibly house the resident sheriff's deputy.

Matias also suggested that for those parents who still do not want to have their children transported south to Grand Oaks or Shasta Lake schools that the district's home school program be an option they know would be made available to them.

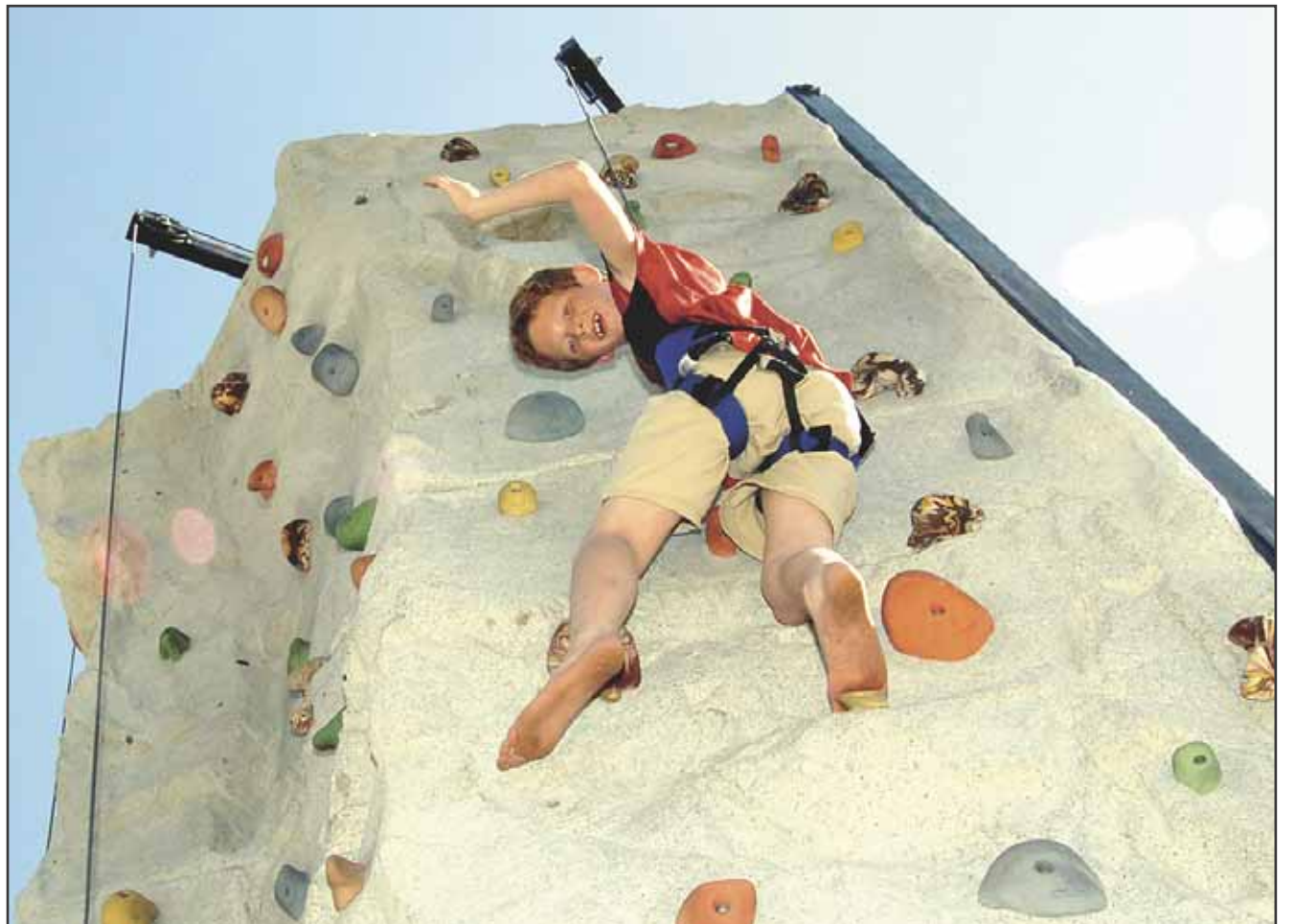

City's 2-year budget includes hiring of sergeant and incentive pay to try and keep deputies here

The addition of a sergeant to the sheriff's office and a longevity pay incentive to try and keep deputies in the city who often leave for a better financial situation elsewhere, were among the items approved by the city council for the first two-year fiscal budget by the city.

The council on Monday voted 4-0 - with councilman Dean Goekler absent - to approve the budget of roughly \$46.5 million in 2006-2007 and \$34.6 in 2007-2008 that will also see the addition of new positions in the city, including an associate planner, an assistant electric utility director and even a full-time janitor.

Interim City Manager Carol Martin said the city created a two-year budget to basically help "plan for the future."

"The city has been more stable in its revenue sources," she said, providing an opportunity to look more long range.

Citing a need to try and keep the deputies they train here in the city,

Sheriff's Capt. Denis Carroll recommended to the council the hiring of a fulltime sergeant to the division, as well as incentive pay to try and keep deputies in the city.

Carroll said it has often been the case that the city will train a deputy here - and pay for that training - only to see the officer accept a higher paying job elsewhere, oftentimes right down the road in Redding.

"We train these people and then they move on," he said, citing one deputy who they spent over \$170,000 to train, only to see him take a job with the Redding Police Department for more pay. That results in the city having to hire more officers that then have to be trained, he said.

"We want to try and bring training costs down and redistribute that money elsewhere," Carroll said.

Among the incentives included in the budget and passed by the council is a five percent longevity pay for officers who choose to stay in Shasta Lake after a three year

period. The other is a specialty pay of five percent for traffic and accident investigation.

On Tuesday, the Board of Supervisors were scheduled to vote on a pay increase for the Sheriff's deputies. Martin said those increases have already been figured into the budget.

Other significant changes or items of special consideration in the general fund, includes the hiring of an associate planner.

According to Interim City Manager Carol Martin, with numerous pending applications in the city, including the Jaxon Baker project on Lake Boulevard, Sherwood Subdivision on Shasta Way and Mountain Gate at Shasta, an audit identified the department would benefit from hiring an associate or a senior level planner to assist the Development Services Director with some of the supervisory, writing and project review duties.

Since earlier this year, the city has also been seeking an as-

sistant electric utility director in a salary range of roughly \$76,000 to \$104,000. So far, however, they have not come up with a qualified candidate for the job.

The city also OK'd Management Analyst John Jones request for a full-time janitor for the city.

Jones said the city currently spends nearly \$29,000 a year for janitorial services that usually only happens on Tuesday and Friday nights. For a little over \$40,190 the city could have a full-time janitor position to not only clean but to provide light maintenance duties at the various buildings around the city, including the John Beaudet Senior Community Center.

One area that Martin said was not included in the budget was for a recreation coordinator, which Public Works Superintendent Dennis Dailley had requested.

The Parks Master Plan, which was approved last year, recommended the hiring of a recreation

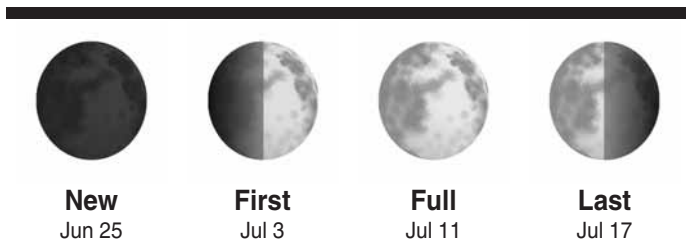

Hartman see-saws on Knauf

One month before the election in November 2004 to become a Shasta County Supervisor (aka Air Pollution Control Board) Linda Hartman complained that, she was, "very upset" Knauf wanted to increase their oxides of nitrogen (NOx) emission limits for their Shasta Lake plant. Now she votes to increase the amount of pollution they can spew over us.

Linda, was that whining about being "very upset" just done to obtain votes?

Linda, you had the opportunity to follow suit with Mr. Cibula and Mr. Kehoe and abstain from voting for Knauf's revisions. But no.

Before you became a Supervisor, you were a City Council member for the city of Shasta Lake. You were always in favor of bringing Knauf here. You bad-mouthed those of us opposed to the fiberglass factory.

Then you say a month before the election you are "very upset" because they (Knauf) didn't tell you the truth. Now you vote for Knauf's increased emissions.

Make up your mind.

At a forum at Shasta College for the District you now represent you indicated Knauf officials had not been truthful with you when they first proposed building their plant in Shasta Lake.

"I studied the issue and visited the plant in Alabama...and I was comfortable in the initial (approval process for Knauf)," Hartman was quoted as saying at the forum in a Shasta Lake Bulletin article in the Oct. 6, 2004 issue. "I live close to the plant and have a family and I wasn't about to support (something) that would be detrimental to the community."

Hartman said she was upset that Knauf officials had not kept to the limits she said they had promised her.

"I asked (Knauf officials

back then) 'are you sure these are the limits you can live by' and they said yes," Hartman said, adding after the forum that they had assured her they were actually well above what they needed.

"I was very upset," she said. "They ought to function within those (original) limits."

Now you state, (June 21, 2006 article in the Record Searchlight) "The amount of pollution from those smokestacks is so insignificant (compared to) all the other pollution that we have," Hartman said after the hearing. "I've lived right near it and I never smell it. I don't know why we have to be so hard on businesses that are trying to succeed."

Linda, it's not what you "never smell" that kills you. How about all the smog, vari-

ous pollutions and micro particulate fiberglass particles your young children and the rest of us citizens in your district will be breathing into our lungs from this business that is "trying to succeed"?

As far as I am concerned, you will never get my vote as my district representative. You are totally incapable of being a true representative of the people of the city of Shasta Lake or Shasta County. You will forever be a, "I second that" Linda.

No, you're not crazy - talking to yourself can help

THE 1 DIET DETECTIVE

Whether you're aware of it or not, most people's lives are accompanied by a stream of internal commentary.

The act of "talking to yourself about yourself" makes the situation more real than just visualizing it. And positive self-talk, also referred to as affirmations, can improve your chances of sticking to your diet and exercising more.

According to James Afremow, Ph.D., a sports physiologist in Tempe, Ariz., and author of *Lengthen Your Line: The 5 Cs for Exceptional Performance in the Game of Life* (iUniverse, 2005), using self-talk as a performance-enhancement technique means mentally rehearsing positive self-statements.

Positive or "champion" self-talk is just one of many powerful techniques for performance improvement, and it requires regular and structured practice to get the full benefit.

When practiced and repeated over time, affirmations can alter your mental climate and empower you to make changes in your life.

"Self-talk can provide a sense of control if you learn to become aware of self-statements and direct them in a positive manner," says JoAnn Dahlkoetter, Ph.D., author of *Your Performing Edge* (Pulgas Ridge Press, 2002) and a sports psychologist in San Carlos, Calif.

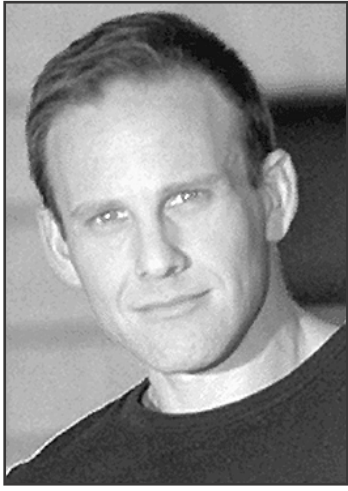
And there are studies to prove it.

"Studies using different sport samples [skiers, tennis players, sprinters, figure skaters] indicated that positive self-talk was effective in enhancing performances. And in the latest study, both instructional and positive self-talk were shown to enhance strength, accuracy and fine motor coordination tasks," adds Michael Voight, Ph.D., a sports psychologist at the University of Southern California.

CORNINESS FACTOR

The key to using affirmations effectively is to overcome what I call "the corniness factor."

Many people feel strange and uncomfortable talking to themselves or putting up a reminder note on their refrigerator or mirror saying they are "great" or, "You can do it



today."

You may even laugh at yourself when you start to use affirmations, and that's OK. Affirmations do sound funny at first. Eventually, however, as you become more comfortable with the idea of yourself as someone who can achieve your goals, you'll become more comfortable using these strategies to reach them.

"Make the affirmations personally meaningful rather than rehearsing generic statements. It's normal and expected to feel strange and uncomfortable making any change at first, so 'fake it until you make it' and 'be comfortable being uncomfortable,'" suggests Afremow.

BE AWARE

It's important to be aware of your current self-talk practices.

"You need to know what you do that motivates you as well as what you do that keeps you from being consistent and committed to your goal. Becoming aware of what you are saying to yourself is an important first step so you can know how much of the self-talk is negative, what the exact wording is, and then find the appropriate replacement language that will improve confidence, motivation and commitment," says Voight.

"Our perception and thoughts often lead to an emotional response. These thoughts and emotions then provide direction and control our actions. Thus, it is crucial to become aware of what thoughts and self-statements you are using prior to training or racing," says Dahlkoetter.

One way to increase your awareness of how well you talk to yourself is to place a handful of paper clips in your front pocket.

"While engaged in a task, transfer one paper clip to your back pocket for each negative thought you identify. See how long it takes before you run out

of paper clips, it might be faster than you expect," says Afremow.

MAKE IT POSITIVE

As automotive pioneer Henry Ford said, "If you think you can do a thing, or think you can't do a thing, you're right."

Think about it this way: Would you ever get on an airplane once you'd overheard the pilot say, "I don't think I can make it all the way to Florida. I just know I'm going to crash; I'm so scared." No, of course not.

And aren't you the pilot of your own life? You're the one in charge. Do you really want to be the one convincing yourself that you won't succeed?

In fact, according to sports psychologist Voight, "Of the 66,000 thoughts we typically have per day, 70 to 80 percent are negative. Not only is that a lot of self-dialogue throughout a day, but that is a lot of negative, self-defeating dialogue a day."

Negative self-talk is associated with poorer performance. It simply undermines your ability to succeed.

An example of negative self-talk would be constantly telling yourself, "I can't lose weight, it's just too difficult," or, "I'll never be able to get out there and walk every day," or, "I can't eat at a restaurant without pigging out on the bread basket."

Granted, there are times when it's natural to feel insecure about your undertakings, but don't be your own worst enemy. At the very least, if you don't feel comfortable with proactive self-affirmations, make sure to put a stop to negative self-talk - that is, telling yourself you *can't* do something.

"Replace negative thoughts with more positive and productive thoughts," says Afremow, who recommends closing your eyes and taking some slow, deep breaths to clear your head and "get the junk out."

"Scolding ourselves is not productive. Holding ourselves accountable and committing to a new plan for the following week is quite productive and motivational," says Voight.

In fact, research reported in the *Journal of Sports Sciences* demonstrated this with two groups of golfers of varying skill levels.

While executing a series of putts, the first group was instructed to believe and tell themselves they would succeed, whereas the second

group was asked to think and tell themselves they would *not* succeed.

The investigators found that the players they'd instructed to engage in negative self-talk performed much worse than those who used positive self-talk, regardless of their skill level.

DON'T GET HIJACKED

Be careful while using self-talk. Once you open the door to using it, your thinking could get hijacked, adds Sandra Cousins, Ph.D., professor emerita at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Canada.

"It only takes one 'if' to get hijacked," she said. "Once you say 'if' you're essentially saying, 'It's not going to happen.'"

PRESENT TENSE

Present your achievement to your mind in the present rather than the future tense.

Although intellectually you know your goal is in the future, successful mental programming dictates that it be stated in the present tense, as an already realized fact, says Dahlkoetter.

A true affirmation is stated as if it is already true. "No 'cans,' 'shoulds,' 'wills,' etc. are to be included. Also, no 'nos' should be included. Use the present tense: 'I am ...' No negatives in the positive self-statement," says Kay Porter, Ph.D., a sports psychologist in Eugene, Ore., and author of *The Mental Athlete* (Human Kinetics, 2003).

KEEP THEM SIMPLE AND SHARP

Don't go overboard with your positive thoughts.

"Take an aspirin, not the whole bottle," says Afremow. "Strive to keep your thoughts short, simple and productive. Avoid over-thinking. Champions think fewer thoughts while performing than those who are less accomplished. In sports, the ultimate goal is to transcend - or go beyond - thought, trusting the body to do its thing."

Reviewing or repeating affirmations can also be a useful part of a pre-performance routine to increase mental readiness.

BE SPECIFIC AND PRO-DUCTIVE

Vague goals lead to vague outcomes. Make your affirmations and self-talk strategies specific to how you want to feel and what

you want to accomplish.

"Being positive is not enough," says Voight. "These athletes keep their self-talk more productive rather than just positive. Productive self-talk is more instructional and technical."

"Instead of working simply to inflate the ego and improve self-esteem, productive self-talk helps you focus on important environmental cues (e.g., there is a doughnut shop coming, I should pass it up) or technical/tactical aspects of performance."

For the person who experiences problems on the job, such an affirmation might go something like: "I am a competent person who is capable of succeeding at this task."

For an overweight person who struggles with poor body image, the affirmation might be: "I am a beautiful person, and I deserve to look the way I want to look."

The repetition of such positive statements will eventually lead to a change in the way you view yourself and your own capabilities. Gradually, the mind responds affirmatively, and you begin to experience your intended results.

WRITE IT

When you begin to think of affirmations, you should write them down and repeat them to yourself either as a kind of meditation or whenever you're experiencing a situation that normally upsets

you, stresses you out or damages your self-esteem.

In fact, try writing your affirmations on individual index cards or Post-it Notes and place them where you can view them regularly - on your desk, refrigerator or nightstand, says Dahlkoetter.

Voight also advises clients to write their negative self-talk and thoughts on a piece of paper prior to arriving at the gym or arena.

"They are to write down everything that's hindering them from performing or exercising well," says Voight. "As they head inside, they will crumple the paper and throw it out in the nearest trash can, symbolically throwing out the 'trash' talking that was going on in their head."

"Then they are to insert prescribed self-talk that is productive, technical, tactical or motivationally oriented, which will help them prepare for their bout of exercise or activity."

coordinator for a period of 12 to 18 months with the intention of building interest and ownership in the city parks.

With the city spending far more on the parks system than the Master Plan recommended, and the Master Plan recommending a Lighting and Landscaping District as the preferred mechanism to support funding of parks maintenance activities, Martin suggested the City first proceed with that avenue to ascertain interest and funding for the parks.

Martin said the \$12 million dollar difference in the two fiscal year budgets is because of capital projects already planned.

In addition to RDA proj-

ects such as the realignment of Cascade Boulevard, other projects include a Law Enforcement Center for the Sheriff's office. Martin said the city has budgeted \$1.5 million for the project, but the City has not come up with a site to house the new offices.

The City also saw rising construction expenses with the Shasta Dam Boulevard project, which is expected to be completed by early spring of 2007 when the Washington to Oregon section is completed.

The city's budget should be on the City of Shasta Lake Web site soon after minor corrections are made to it, Martin said.

Bosenko likely to take over as sheriff in early to mid-August

Shasta County sheriff elect Tom Bosenko is expected to assume his new post in early August, five months ahead of schedule, said Shasta County Dist. 3 Supervisor Glenn Hawes.

Hawes said Thursday supervisors would honor the wishes of acting Sheriff Larry Schaller who said he would step aside once a new sheriff was elected, providing for a smooth transition.

Bosenko won the election with 20,108 votes to McDannold's 18,423, for a 52.08 percent to 47.72 percent margin. There were also

76 write-in votes. In the Gateway Unified School District Measure B, the final count showed 3,331 yes votes to 3,096 no votes, or a 51.83 percent yes vote. A school bond measure must have 55 percent of the vote total to be passed.

The election department finished counting all the absentee ballots June 20, two weeks following the election and those results were to be certified by county supervisors Tuesday at press time.
