## NEWS OF THE WEIRD

On May 6, at Calumet Park Cemetery in Merrillville, Ind., Michael Schreiber, 22, fell unconscious, with two broken legs, the victim of a half-ton gravestone that fell on him after he had knocked 14 over.

## Local T.V. series on West Nile virus begins

Community Access Channel, cable Channel 11, will air an informational program by the Shasta Mosquito and Vector Control District on mosquito control and West Nile virus (WNV) in Northern California.

The program, produced with the help of Namasté Video productions, is intended to provide information useful to the public about the mosquito-borne disease, the SMVCD said.

The program is scheduled to air Tuesdays from 7:30 to 8 p.m. beginning last night and running 13 weeks.

On the show John Albright, biologist for SMVCD, and Dr. Lou Anne Cummings, Shasta County Deputy Public Health Officer, discuss aspects of WNV and the District's comprehensive mosquito control program with host, Bob Belongie.

The show provides practical information that people in northern California can use to protect themselves and their pets from West Nile virus. The District plans to have DVDs of the program available to give out for educational purposes.

"We wanted to get this show out to educate the public before West Nile arrives this year," Albright stated.

The District has been monitoring the spread of WNV since well before its arrival in Shasta County, and joined with numerous other affected local agencies in the Shasta County West Nile Virus Task Force to provide an organized countywide response to this disease threat.

WNV transmission has peaked every year, since its arrival in Shasta County, in the months of July and August when the *Culex spp.* mosquitoes that spread this disease are at their peak populations. In 2006 there were four reported human cases, including one fatality in Shasta County

## Two accidents including fatal, mar holiday weekend

Memorial Day Weekend around the Shasta Lake area was marred by at least two accidents, one of which claimed the life of an Anderson teenager while the other seriously injured a Redding woman.

Laurel J. Buthman, 50, was listed in fair condition Tuesday at Mercy Medical Center following a solo accident on a dune buggy Saturday west of Shasta Dam, about 100 yards uphill from the ATV training area.

According to the California Highway Patrol, Buthman was driving her 1971 dune buggy northbound on Coram Road on the south side of Westside Road around 6:30 p.m. when she allowed the vehicle to drift off the right side of the road, overcorrected and drove up a steep hillside. The vehicle then rolled over onto its top onto the road below, trapping Buthman a short time until other people in the area pulled the vehicle off of her neck.

Buthman was wearing a lap belt, the CHP said. The Shasta Lake Fire Protection District EMTs responded to the accident and found Buthman was breathing but non-responsive when they arrived. She then stopped breathing, they said, and a bag valve mask was used to get her breathing again.

Buthman sustained serious head injuries and was airlifted to Mercy Medical Center. The CHP said she was arrested for allegedly driving under the influence.

A day earlier, Daniell Trent Blake, 18, of Anderson was killed when a Jet Ski he was driving collided with a boat at the Jones Valley inlet on Shasta Lake, the Shasta County Sheriff's office said.

According to authorities, deputies from the Shasta County Boating Safety Unit responded shortly after 4 p.m. to reports of a boating collision on the Pit Arm of Shasta Lake.

The sheriff's office said statements from witnesses and the parties involved indicated Michael Moynihan, 30, of Redding, had launched his vessel at the Jones Valley public ramp and were headed northbound towards Jones Valley Point.

As Moynihan reached the area of the Pit Arm, he reportedly noticed a personal water craft operated by Blake traveling toward his port (left) side. Authorities said Moynihan attempted to avoid the collision by slowing and turning to the right, but Blake collided with the left side of Moynihan's vessel.

Moynihan and the occupants of his boat went in the water and attempted to aid Blake, the sheriff's office said. Blake was transported to Mercy Medical Center where he was later pronounced dead.

The sheriff's office said Moynihan showed no signs of intoxication at the site and, in fact, was tested for alcohol and was found to have 0.00 blood alcohol content in his system.

An autopsy on Blake Monday showed he died of multiple traumatic injuries from being struck by the boat, the coroner's office said. Toxicology test results on Blake will take four to six weeks, they said.

# Remember when...

I remember and admire those who fought the good fight. I also give credit to those concepts and ideals they fought for. That is what gives substance to both a country and its inhabitants.

Some of us can put this in first person context. Others have learned from older relatives. Some have read about it as past history. Sadly there are those who have dismissed it as unimportant, irrelevant, or outright fantasy.

How can anyone contend that the holocaust never took place? Yet there are those who say that it was merely propaganda. Even when people who actually survived that horrible event give eyewitness reports, there are those who label them deranged or outright liars.

How can this be? Worse, how can supposedly intelligent people fall for the rhetoric of these fanatics and ignore facts that belie their words?

Perhaps it has a lot to do with conditioning. Even back in the olden days we had bad guys. While some may have become sensational because of their deeds, most people still knew that what they did was not in the best interest of the general public. There was a general feeling that everyone had a stake in the "common good."

Bad role models are nothing new. Back in the old days even the directive: "Do as I say, not as I do" had some merit. At least it was an admission that wrong was being done. Even a bad example can serve as a teaching tool if the person committing the acts is honest and doesn't excuse his acts.

Fast forward. We are now bombarded with acts that defy common sense, compassion or even basic survival instincts. Have we become conditioned to this also? Have we become so inured to violence and inhumane behavior that it no longer shocks our sensibilities? Perhaps that is closer to the truth than many of us would like to admit. Perhaps we feel that just because we are not committing the act ourselves it is okay to witness it as an uninvolved spectator, somewhat like fights on the playground. We get an adrenaline rush vicariously without running the risk of a bloody nose or humiliation.

The problem with not being the actual combatant is that, since we suffer no pain, we tend to lose interest unless the acts we witness are more bizarre or outlandish. That could explain some of the bad sci-fi movies that abound. Most not only defy logic, they have little artistic merit.

In the ancient times of the Romans there were the gladiators or Christians versus the lions. In the not so distant past we had our "rassling" that surpassed mere wrestling as spectator sports.

Somewhere along the way the "shock-jock" mentality emerged as an example of first amendment rights. Back in the old days, even the most hardened filth monger felt that there were some things not meant for the ears of children, grandma or "ladies." That doesn't seem to be the case anymore.

Child neglect and abuse are so commonplace anymore that Web sites that aid child predators in finding victims is another "first amendment" right. The term "lady" seems to have become obsolete. Any respect that once was shown for the female gender, either through parental training or social mores, has gone the way of the dodo bird.

We view the elderly being beaten by young law-breakers while spectators stand by and do nothing. Any excuse given for such lack of concern doesn't hold much water. If the spectators were afraid for their own safety, what about the "mob" mentality? There were more of them than one hoodlum. If they fear that gangs will retaliate against them if they do something to stop even a gang member, how can they defend a community or themselves as members if lawlessness has reached such levels? Communities become what its members allow it to become. The same analogy could be used for societies. We constitute our society in one way or another. We either become a part of the problem, or we try to correct the problem. Living isn't just a spectator sport.

It may have a lot to do with semantics. Because our language is a "live" language, it is constantly changing. If words themselves are not modified, their meanings often are. Some new words or concepts are done intentionally, some out of poor grammar or understanding of language rules. Cases in point: The phrase "I couldn't care less" means that it is on the bottom of my interest level. Too often people say, "I could care less," which means there are other things that I care less about. The word irregardless is incorrect, but is used even by supposedly learned people. It is redundant. Its meaning is the same as regardless.

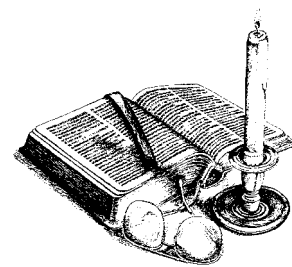
female was experiencing nausea, vomiting and head pain. Both were transported to Shasta Regional Medical Center.

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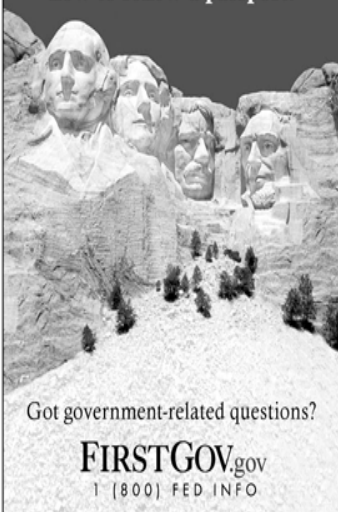

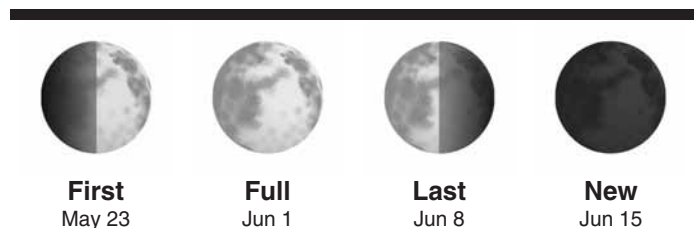

The UV Index is measured on a 0 - 11 number scale, with a higher UV Index showing the need for greater skin protection.

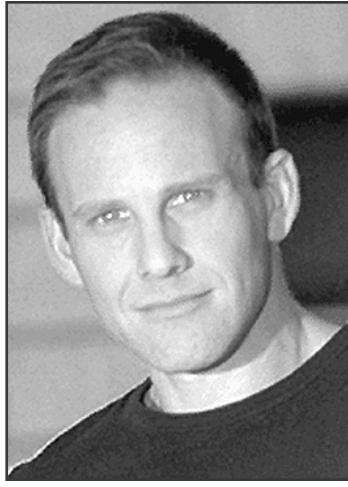
# Dried fruit: Is it really nature's candy?

Have you ever tried dried cherries? Wow, are they good.

Truth be told, I couldn't stop eating them. I kept telling myself that it was just to taste them for research. I tried not to be fooled by the health halo.

Thinking: It's a fruit, so it's healthy. But I wasn't mentally prepared, and so I overindulged. I wanted to find out if dried fruit is really healthy, and here's what I discovered.

## Why Dry Fruit?

Before the invention of chemical additives to keep foods fresh, drying was one method of preserving food. Organisms that create food spoilage need water to survive.

Basically, the drying process removes most of the moisture from the food, thus preserving it. The three most common methods of drying are solar, oven and an electric dehydrator.

## Nutritional Value

Even though many supermarkets put dried fruit in the candy section, it can be an excellent source of fiber, nutrients, antioxidants and complex carbohydrates. And some varieties have other special benefits.

For instance, dried cherries have recently been shown to help fight jet lag.

## Fresh Fruit vs. Dried Fruit

In terms of weight control, there is no comparison. Fresh fruit is the better choice. You get much more for fewer calories.

For instance, 1 cup of dried blueberries (sweetened) (296 blueberries) has 600 calories, whereas 1 cup of fresh blueberries has only 84 calories.

So, before you start digging into a bag of dried apricots or cherries, consider how many you're going to eat. A low-calorie food is only a good deal if it fills you up at the end of a serving.

The problem with dried fruit is that when the water is removed, it becomes less filling without losing any calories. Dried fruit just becomes sweeter, more concentrated and easier to over-consume.

Plus, many producers of dried fruit add sugar, thus increasing their already dense calorie levels.

In fact, ounce-for-ounce, all types of dried fruit are much higher in calories

than their fresh equivalents, because of the water that's lost and the concentration of sugar that is created during the drying process.

Take a look at raisins compared with grapes: They have about 73 percent less water than grapes.

## What About Antioxidants?

In terms of the antioxidants in dried fruit, research published in the *Journal of the American College of Nutrition* reported that dried figs and plums have the best nutrient scores.

Additionally, the researchers concluded, "Dried fruits have a greater nutrient density, greater fiber content, increased shelf life, and significantly greater phenol antioxidant content compared to fresh fruits. The quality of the antioxidants in the processed dried fruit is the same as in the corresponding fresh fruit."

However, vitamin C that is present in many fresh fruits is destroyed by heat in the drying process.

Bottom line: Dried fruit is high in fiber and carbohydrates and low in fat. It has significant antioxidant value; however, because it's dried, its nutrients are very concentrated, and so are its calories.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the recommended serving size for dried fruit is half that of fresh.

I would also recommend portioning your dried fruit out into small, manageable serving sizes by splitting a regular bag into four to six servings.

## Dried Fruit vs. Juice

Even 100 percent juice has real calories. In most cases it has the same number of calories per serving as soda and sweetened iced tea.

Juice is less filling than dried fruit, and it contains less of the fiber fruit is famous for (whose health benefits include reducing the risk of some cancers, lowering cholesterol and keeping you "regular").

For instance, 1 cup of pineapple juice is 120 calories and has little or no fiber, whereas 10 pieces of dried pineapple chunks are about 140 calories, and the dried pineapple rings are about 65 to 70 calories each, with about 1 gram of fiber.

Compare that with the fruit itself, which is about 70 calories per cup with about 2 grams of fiber.

Bottom line: Most varieties of dried fruit have most of the fiber and nutrients that are in fresh fruit.

Whereas the juice may have many of the antioxidants, but it is missing the fiber, and it isn't as filling. Dried fruit (without added sugar) might be the better bet compared with juice.

## Dried Fruit vs. Potato Chips

A potato chip is a vegetable, right? The problem is that potato chips are fried and have about 150 calories per ounce compared with about 100 calories per ounce for, say, banana chips.

If you choose baked chips, yes, the calorie count is lower (130 calories per ounce), but the dried fruit is

still better on several levels. It's lower in calories, can be more filling (because of the fiber) and has many valuable health perks (such as antioxidants and fiber) lacking in potato chips.

## Dried Fruit vs. Freeze-dried

Freeze-dried foods are not just for astronauts and hikers.

Freeze-drying food removes the water almost entirely, which lowers the weight, and while you don't get the same feelings of fullness you do from dried fruit (which is about 25 percent water vs. 6 percent for freeze-dried), it can be a satisfying snack that still has health perks. The antioxidants found in the fresh fruit are maintained after freeze-drying.

One company, Sensible Foods ([www.sensiblefoods.com](http://www.sensiblefoods.com)), has a freeze-drying process that removes the water while maintaining the product's cell structure and nutritional value and intensifying its natural flavor.

Freeze-dried food also tends to come in lower-weight packages than dried — which means fewer calories if you eat the whole package.

A bag of dried fruit can be about 450-500 calories, whereas each full bag of freeze-dried fruit (equivalent to 1/2 cup of fresh fruit) makes for a satisfying snack at only 80 calories with 1 gram of fiber.

One bag of Crispy Green Apples (10 grams per bag) from [Crispygreen.com](http://Crispygreen.com) is only 35 calories.

So freeze-dried fruit can be a healthy alternative to chips and other snack foods. Other benefits of freeze-dried fruit are that it has a long shelf life and can be stored and/or easily packed for on-the-go eating.

And finally, freeze-dried fruit, unlike regular dried, is often made without any added sugar.
